

- Live to Avoid Pain
- ✓ Pleasure OKAY ... yeehaw
- ✓ Pleasure sometimes seen as Hedonism

Stoic Philosophers

- ✓ Logos/Reason created world ... all in world
- ✓ Virtue—Live in Harmony
- Each had spark of Logos
- ✓ Die—Spark goes back to Logos
- ✓ Believed in Immortality of the Soul










Areopagus Hill viewed from the Acropolis that is, viewed from Parthenon







24 "The God who made the world and everything in it is the Lord of heaven and earth and does not live in temples built by human hands.

And he is not served by human hands, as if he needed anything.
 Rather, he himself gives everyone life and breath and everything else.



From one man he made all the nations, that they should inhabit the whole earth; and he marked out their appointed times in history & the boundaries of their lands.

²⁷ God did this so that they would seek him and perhaps reach out for him and find him, though he is not far from any one of us.

Then Dr. Apostle Paul pulls a fast one Paul quotes from their own philosophers



Quoting from Epimenides 6th B.C.
both Plato & Aristotle quote & revere him

²⁸ 'For in him we live and move and have our being.'


Then from Greek poet Aratus, c. 315–245 B.C. from near Paul's home in Tarsus in Cilicia


