Teachers Embroiled In 15-Year-Long Test-Taking Fraud Scandal, Feds Say

MEMPHIS, Tenn. – It was a brazen and surprisingly long-lived scheme, authorities said, to help aspiring public school teachers cheat on the tests they must pass to prove they are qualified to lead their classrooms.

For 15 years, teachers in three Southern states paid Clarence Mumford Sr. – himself a longtime educator – to send someone else to take the tests in their place, authorities said. Each time, Mumford received a fee of between \$1,500 and \$3,000 to send one of his test ringers

Film Revives Questions about Lincoln's Faith

WASHINGTON – There is a moment in Steven Spielberg’s new movie *Lincoln* when the 16th president asks the kind of big question usually tackled by religion: Why are we here?

“Do you think we choose the times into which we are born,” Daniel Day-Lewis, as Abraham Lincoln, asks two young workers in the telegraph office. “Or do we fit the times we are born into?”

That’s as close as the film comes to probing the faith of Abraham Lincoln. But the nature of Lincoln’s faith—or the lack thereof—has remained one of the most fascinating aspects of the man who freed the slaves, preserved the Union and carried the wounded nation through its bloodiest war.

Beginning almost immediately after his assassination 147 years ago, hundreds of books, articles and essays have appeared, many claiming Lincoln was—if not in fact, then in sentiment—a Christian, Catholic, Jew, Mormon, psychic, spiritualist, agnostic and atheist.



Maness — When I saw the movie, I was struck by its realism. How in the world did they get Daniel Day-Lewis to look so much like Washington? After the movie, I could not wait to read more on Lincoln and Representative Thaddeus Stevens, a lead congressman and abolitionist in the House at the time. It is hard for us to conceive the kind of man Lincoln was that so ardently pursued the course he took, uphill a lot of the way, against the grain of most, and all too often alone. In the short space of two and half hours, this movie brought out in a masterful way the tensions, politics, moral struggles, and the near-racehorse-win-by-a-nose tension upon which the 13th Amendment’s passage hung by a thread. As well as the wit, humor, uncanny wisdom, and courage of Lincoln. An outstanding movie. I highly recommend it.
